PASTORAL LETTER

I'm sure I'm not alone in feeling powerless in the face of a world where power and the will to abuse it seem to be spiralling out of control. I feel powerless in the face of the grim events in Ukraine and the Middle East, where human ingenuity is put to building ever more ingenious ways for people to kill other people.

I often worry that the fruits of our intellect are outstripping our wisdom to use them well. Why is it that every couple of months, one of the pioneers of Artificial Intelligence research pops up in the news to tell us it could wipe out the human race? Most recently, it was Professor Yoshua Bengio from Canada, whose research is cited more often than any other computer scientist in the world, who left Faisal Islam visibly shocked when he told him bluntly on *Newsnight* that "the worst case scenario" from AI "is human extinction".

I feel powerless in the face of not only of Artificial Intelligence galloping ahead but also Genetic Modification. I worry about why we feel driven to develop these very powerful technologies quickly, even when we know things as seemingly innocuous as social media and video streaming are drive some people crazy, partly thanks to smartphones that follow us everywhere, constantly buzzing and demanding attention.

Despite these problems, technology is often presented to us uncritically as good of itself. We live at a time when people seek truth in spreadsheets rather than sonnets. Yet human beings are more than rational creatures. We are made not for power, which often brings out the worst in us, but for beauty, truth, goodness, and love.

One beautiful idea from Christian theology is that the Holy Spirit is the circulation of love between God the Father and Jesus Christ—Love as a person in its own right, Love as God.

What does this have to do with our daily lives? Well, if power brings out the worst in us, it is often other people who bring out the best. We see this most powerfully in the love within families, but a strong society is made up not just of families but dense networks of organisations and communities.

In the smartphone era, many voluntary organisations have weakened as people retreat into their own homes, streaming entertainment and having their shopping delivered. In this context, it is a radical act of good to stay involved in the cricket club or the parish church, the art group or the Royal British Legion, especially if we help with the back office finance work and administration necessary for any voluntary group to thrive.

At a time when it feels like we are powerless to stop the world spiralling out of control, these little local gifts of our time and ourselves are one thing we can do; and they remind us that we are made not for power but for love—of our families, our neighbours, our country, and ourselves.

And the Wall Came Tumbling Down

At the end of September, after heavy rainfall, around six metres of the west churchyard wall collapsed. Unfortunately, our insurance claim was declined, as the rainfall didn't qualify as storm damage. The repair is no simple fix. As a **retaining** (not just boundary) wall, it supports the southern section too. In addition, the wall is in a conservation area, falls within the curtilage of a Grade II listed building, and is the boundary to sacred burial grounds.

We have employed the services of a structural engineer to survey the damage. This raised immediate concerns about the adjoining southern wall at the corner near the footpath gate, as it was no longer properly supported and risked collapse. On safety advice, we applied for – and were granted – a footpath closure order from Wiltshire Council: the first six months cost £1,850, later extended by 12 months for a further £875.

The engineer's plan for restoration involves clearing the rubble, laying foundations, constructing a reinforced retaining wall with drainage, and facing it with salvaged stone to match the original. After reviewing several quotes, we awarded the job to a specialist conservation firm that has previously worked on the church.

Before work can begin, we have needed to apply for several layers of approval. A Faculty (planning permission within the Church of England) was granted by the Diocese of Salisbury and the Consistory Court. Because the wall falls within the curtilage of a Grade II listed building within a conservation area, Wiltshire Council have required an application for full planning permission. With help from a planning consultant and an arborist, the application is now in and posted at the churchyard gate. Worton Parish Council raised no objections at their meeting on 9th June.

The restoration is expected to cost in the region of £23,000. We have begun the fundraising process and are applying for grants, but we will also need local support to bridge the gap. We are holding an event on Saturday 12th July 2025 to provide more information and to begin our community fundraising – see the poster elsewhere in The Bridge for details.

Edington Music Festival: August 17th-24th


The Edington Festival of Music within the Liturgy is celebrating its 70th birthday this year! Started in 1956 by the Priory Church's new vicar, Canon Ralph Dudley, over one weekend with half a dozen of his choral scholar friends, it was part of a bid to raise enough money to repair the church's very leaky roof. In its 69 years so far, and now with three choirs, six organists, over 70 participants in all, and over 8 days of services, the festival has raised over £250,000 for the benefit of the parish and the wider communities which host this wonderful event.

Its congregations now come from all over the globe, from New Zealand to North America, drawn to what is the oldest, and generally regarded as the finest, celebration of church music within the context for which it was written.

This year's theme, "The Ways of the Lord", follows journeys made along roads and ways in the Holy Land, with music celebrating the anniversaries of the birth of the leading composer of the late 16th century, Palestrina, and of some more recent composers, Sir John Rutter and Bob Chilcott, whose compositions for the season of Christmas feature in Tuesday's 'Road to Bethlehem'. In between, there is a wide range of music from Byrd, Gibbons, and Hassler, through to Warlock, Daley and McDowall, taking in favourites such as Stanford, Howells and Britten en route. Three choirs will sing at four daily services including Choral Evensong, recorded for later broadcast on BBC Radio 3, on Wednesday afternoon; a rare liturgical performance of Wood's Mark Passion on Friday evening; and Choral Matins on both Friday and Saturday mornings. Services are free, and everyone is welcome to enjoy sublime music and spiritual solace.

The Festival Supper, the light-hearted demonstration of the relationship between festival and Parish, is an evening of food and music this year on **Wednesday 20th August,** and tickets can be bought from Hugh Hancock; <u>musicalsupper@edingtonfetival.org</u>.



MESSAGE FROM OUR WILTSHIRE COUNCILLOR

There's a right place for solar PV! And have you thought about Solar Together?

I know that many of you are concerned about too many "solar farms" taking over the beautiful landscapes across Devizes Rural West and Wiltshire as a whole, and I have been working for many months alongside the Potterne Solar Action Group and Potterne Parish Council to make the case to Wiltshire Council that One Tree Hill and Potterne Park Farm are the wrong locations for large-scale solar installations.

Some months ago, I called these planning applications into Planning Committee, which means that the Planning Officer's report and recommendation, is considered by Wiltshire Councillors sitting on the Planning Committee, rather than the decisions being made by the Planning Officer under delegation. After a huge amount of detailed work by the brilliant Potterne Solar Action Group (supported by Potterne and Easterton Parish Councils amongst others) and bringing together a wide range of local skills to make compelling "planning" arguments why these are the wrong locations. I am pleased to say that for One Tree Hill - the Planning Officer agrees with us – it is entirely the wrong location for a solar farm.

The Officer's report could not have been clearer – he cited concerns of harm to the landscape, loss of "best and most versatile" agricultural land, impacts on biodiversity and unacceptable Highways concerns. As he refused the application it will not now go before the Committee. This is a great step forward and I very much hope that similar points will be made when the Potterne Park Farm (and Poulshot) applications are considered in the coming months.

So that brings me on to Solar Together – Wiltshire Council's group-buying initiative for homes and businesses which offers high-quality solar panel and battery storage installation from trusted suppliers at a competitive cost. Delivered in partnership with iChoosr, an independent group purchasing provider, it uses "group buying" to secure competitive prices from vetted

installers. This means residents and businesses can get a better deal than they might get on the open market — with no obligation to proceed and clear, personal recommendations are provided to every household or business that registers.

The scheme is open to homeowners, small and medium-sized businesses, and associations. Now in its fourth year, the scheme continues to grow in popularity. In previous years, it has enabled more than 1,700 Wiltshire households to install solar panels and battery storage, with a combined investment of over £15 million into local green energy.



It's free for residents to register their interest and there is no commitment to go ahead. Those who register will receive a personal recommendation based on their roof and energy needs. Registrations close on 8 August 2025 and more information is at https://solartogether.co.uk/wiltshire/home



Update on Traffic Calming Scheme

From Cllr Richard Slack

Following extensive consultation with the village and Wiltshire Council, a number of road safety measures were considered by Wiltshire Council. Traffic calming measures in the centre of the village was recommended by Highways Engineers and approved by Wiltshire Council.

The benefits of this measure include:

- Providing a second informal pedestrian crossing to allow pedestrians to cross the road where the single pavement switches from the northside to the southside in the vicinity of the Rose and Crown.
- To calm traffic approaching the western end of the village into the restricted section in the centre of the High Street. With priority afforded to traffic passing from west to east in the vicinity of the Rose and Crown, this will prevent traffic on the left-hand side of the road assuming it has right of way on what is effectively a single lane road.
- To protect resident's cars that park on the road between the school and the Rose and Crown.

Funding for this works comes from Wiltshire Council funds that are specifically allocated for small scale projects to improve road safety in towns and villages. The Parish Council will fund 25% of costs through funds paid for by development in the village. If the Parish Council do not use these funds, they will be returned to Wiltshire Council.

Wiltshire Council Senior Traffic Engineer has also stated that he will be doing a letter drop to the effected premises and will speak with local businesses. He acknowledges that there will be some disruption but says that the end result will be worth it. He has also advised that the formal parking restrictions that were in the preliminary proposals are no longer being pursued but that they will be marking existing accesses with white access markings to highlight where cars should not park.

How is the Parish Council Funded?

The principle method of funding a Parish Council is through the Precept. This is calculated by dividing the amount of money the council needs to meet its annual budget by the Tax Base (number of Band D properties in the parish less discounts and exemptions). For 2025/26 this equates to £43.68 per year for a Band D property (or 84 pence per week). You will find this itemised separately on your council tax bill. This was a rise of only 0.5% compared with last year.

Whilst the Precept covers all the day-to-day running costs such as employment of a Clerk, Grass Cutting, Insurances and Subscriptions, small grants etc it is not enough for any real investment into the village, for that we have to rely on grants from Wiltshire Council or other agencies. However, we now have an opportunity to make improvements with monies received because of new housing developments.

Community Infrastructure Levy and Section 106

Since 2015 Wiltshire Council have charged a Community Infrastructure Levy to property developers to pay for local infrastructure. This has only impacted the village in the last couple of years since we have had a number of new property developments in the village. The Parish Council gets 15% of these monies which must be spent within five years on:

- a) The provision, improvement, replacement, operation or maintenance of infrastructure; or
- b) Anything else that is concerned with addressing the demands that development places on an area

We have already given the Village Hall Trustees grants of £1,200 and £10,000 and will use a small proportion to pay 25% of the cost of the traffic calming scheme proposed by Wiltshire Council.

We still have over £30,000 to allocate to projects over the next few years and are developing a Parish Plan over the coming months with village improvement ideas. If you have any suggestions as to how you would like the Parish Council to spend this money, then please email me and your suggestions will be discussed at our next meeting.

In addition to the CIL monies the development at Sandleaze attracted a Section 106 payment. This is a planning obligation to mitigate any negative impacts of the development. Two payments are due to be made to the Parish Council:

- a) Off-site play area contribution of £27,855.36 for equipped play which would enable an upgrade to the existing play area at Sandleaze.
- b) Sports contribution of £10,670 to go towards Sandleaze playing field


Whilst the location of any improvements is part of the agreement, the actual play equipment and improvements to the playing field is up to us. This will also be added to the Parish Plan and your suggestions would be welcomed.


Five Lanes School has also reinstated our Parent and Friends Association which has held its first meeting already. It was great to see the support for the school and we look forward to watching this grow.

FLOWER OF THE MONTH



Calla Lily
(Zantedeschia)

In all things of nature
There is something of the marvellous.
Aristotle

The lily that is not a lily. With thick waxy flowers and leaves they are hearty garden additions. Like soldiers with their shields and swords raised, they guard the edges of the garden or clump together for solidarity.

Native to South Africa they are considered tender perennials as temperatures below –3C will likely kill the rhizome. They can be dug up and stored over the winter for replanting in the spring. With their trumpet like flowers heralding the coming summer from May to June.

Be sure not to confuse the Calla lily (Zantedeschia) with the hardy bog loving cousin Calla palustris. Although the names are similar and they produce the same white waxy flowers, the Calla palustris need to be grown in a shallow pond which will drown the Calla lily.

You are spoilt for choice when it comes to picking the colours. They range from the classic pure white, to soft pink, to vibrant orange, to burgundy and even a near-black. Additionally, you can find Calla lilies in various combinations of the colour varieties.

Calla lilies are one of my favourite flowers—most likely due to their hardiness and ease of growing. Their sturdy stems and thick flowers make me smile when I see them swaying gently in the light breeze.


