

Home Upgrade Grant Scheme (HUGS) - do you qualify?

Wiltshire Council has been successful in securing more than £3.6m government funding for home energy efficiency upgrades. This funding will allow the council to support retrofitting in owner-occupied and privately rented homes (landlords with no more than four properties).

The qualifying criteria are:

- not connected to mains gas
- have an energy performance certificate (EPC) rating of band D-G
- household income of less than £31.000

The retrofits will include:

- energy efficiency measures such as wall and loft insulation
- low-carbon heating technologies such as heat pumps
- renewable technologies such as solar PV
- smart measures such as smart heating controls

It would be great if qualifying residents in Worton and Marston could take advantage of this brilliant opportunity for warmer and more energy efficient homes.

A LETTER FROM REV GERRY LYNCH

This time of year is full of contradictions. Driving across Salisbury Plain the other night, I was delighted to notice a definite streak of twilight on the horizon at 6 o'clock. The first brave flowers have started pushing their way out, especially the snowdrops. Yet it can still be bitterly cold.

Even when things are at their bleakest, there are signs of new life, of the cycle of nature turning from retreat back towards growth again. We should be grateful for these seasonal signs of hope at a time when the global situation is more worrying than at any time since my 1980s boyhood. I'm sure many of you, like me, often find yourselves grimacing when you hear the news.

We've been in a succession of economic and political crises, domestic and global, since 2008, and they seem to be getting worse. The Post Office scandal shows terrible deterioration in the calibre and integrity of senior people both in our public services and the private sector alike. These political and economic crises reflect a deeper cultural crisis.

Life, as we all know, can't consist only of good times. The world has its golden ages and times of trouble, and so do our own lives. Yet the message sold to us by advertising and marketing is so often that life can always be good, that we can distract ourselves from our problems with the click of a button on the right website (and the accompanying deduction of a few quid from our bank account). Things will feel better, advertising screams at us, after a new conservatory, a jumbo fast-food meal, or a twenty quid flutter on United's next match.

Writing last month, the novelist and essayist Paul Kingsnorth, to my mind one of the most interesting British thinkers of our times, said that we lived at a time of "feast without fasting", because our economy depended on "endless, consumer-driven, growth". This is, he said, like taking a child to a sweet shop and allowing them to eat anything they want – it isn't as much fun as they thought, and they just end up sick.

In the Church's year, the antidote to too much feasting is the season of Lent, which starts this year on Wednesday 14 February. Some people say Lent should be about the extra good deeds you do rather than what you give up. Well, extra good deeds are always great, but perhaps like me you already feel there aren't enough hours in the day. In any case, it does us all good to give up a few luxuries for a while.

Apart from anything else, giving things up for a month and a half means one appreciates them all the more when Lent ends at Easter – just the right time of year for feasting, with the weather getting warmer and a riot of flowers and bowers all around us. I hope the world will feel in a better state by them – but, realistically, I don't think it will.

Fundraising



We intend to transfer our regular giving to the Parish Giving Scheme. Donations can then be inflation-linked each year to keep up with the

cost of living. Since Christmas, the church QR code has already been used and a three-figure amount collected – feel free to try it! We have other campaigns in mind to encourage giving for specific things – like churchyard upkeep for example, currently over £4,000 pa.

Fabric

Our wall heaters, having given excellent service for many years, are now

beginning to fail. Suitable replacements need to be sourced and money for purchase and installation found. Churchyard boundaries are causing concern and although areas of the churchyard have been deliberately wilded, the brambles coming from neighbouring properties are becoming a nuisance.



Finance

Our Parish Share (Parish Share is the sum of money paid by each parish every year to the diocese to support local ministry) was not



paid in full this year and, having said that, a shortfall of around £7,000 is still expected. We already know the Parish Share for this year will increase and we anticipate this year's quinquennial report will throw up other calls upon our already stretched finances. Our financial state is a cause for concern and bold action is needed to address this.

Edington Arts is celebrating the start of their tenth season on Saturday 23 rd March with a full length (two hour) performance of Bach's St John Passion by the Oxford Bach Soloists and orchestra under their conductor Tom Hammond-Davies. The great international tenor Mark Padmore will be singing the role of The Evangelist. The performance is being generously sponsored by Edington Station Yard Ltd, and by The Three Daggers.

Bach's account of the Passion from the Gospel according to St John is 'punchier' than that of the St Matthew, and the superb communication skills of both soloists and chorus will be used to most moving effect. The Oxford Bach Soloists have been performing the St John Passion on Good Friday in Oxford for many years, where it has become an iconic, essential ingredient of the preparations for Easter. This will be the first time they have performed the St John Passion during Lent outside Oxford, and we are delighted they have chosen Edington as their venue. Their recent London debut, with Bach's Christmas Oratorio, received a five-star review in The Guardian, whose reviewer said "This virile, collegiate approach to Bach is the most exciting I've heard in a very long time".

Lots to report this month....

Chair of Trustees

Many of you will know that Jeff and I have now left the village though I agreed to stay on as Chair of the Village Hall Trustees for a limited period so that the Hall could continue to function. However, I am really pleased to be able to report that **Lionel Dawson** of Marston has now volunteered to take on this role. I have met with Lionel a couple of times and think he will be an excellent addition to the team. He has lots of energy and enthusiasm and will no doubt come up with some exciting new ideas. It is also an added bonus that he comes from Marston as we have tried for several years to get some representation from Marston onto the Trustee group. Lionel has to be officially voted into this position at a Management Committee meeting which I am in the process of setting up. The hope is that the committee will agree to us co-chairing for the duration of the fundraising for the Kitchen (see below) with me taking on the fund raising and Lionel taking on everything else.

Kitchen Project

We have now sent out Invitations to Tender (ITT) for the replacement of the kitchen at the Village Hall. We expect to receive bids early February and will then be clearer how much more funding we need to raise. We hope that the bulk of this work can be undertaken during the school summer holidays but this will obviously depend on the availability of the contractors. We will keep you informed of progress through 'The Bridge'.

A very successful warm space event was held on Saturday, January 12th at the Hall. This was facilitated by Marion and Howard Rutter and enjoyed by 19 villagers of all ages. Semington Brook Breach beside Worton Flood Relief Tilt Gate

We think it's very important to present the facts relating to how this breach occurred.

The river at Worton splits into two branches, Semington Brook and the Mill Leat; both are classified by the Environment Agency as "Main River".

At a meeting at 'All Saints Church' on the 20th October, members of both Marston and Worton parish councils attended, together with Tamara Reay, our Wiltshire County Councillor and representatives of the Environment Agency (EA).

We were there to discuss the very serious flooding issue upstream on the bridle path and the adjoining field next to the Ray Bridge.

The rain was so bad that the meeting had to be held in the church.

At this meeting the EA was asked if its Worton Sluice gate was at its lowest level.

They admitted in the meeting that they didn't know.

Subsequently we have found out to our cost that the sluice was NOT at its lowest level.

On the night of the 26th October, six days later, water levels were higher than at any time in the 17 years we've been at The Old Mill.

The leat was over-topping the bank down the back-slope into Semington Brook below; a length of about 10m. This overspill resulted in a significant portion of the bank of Semington Brook being washed away. I could see water bubbling through the bank of the leat, probably through crayfish burrows.

I met with the EA on site and pleaded for sandbags to stop the water over-spilling into Semington Brook. I was told they couldn't do anything because there was serious flooding in Chippenham and the whole of Wessex. Overnight the situation became far worse and the bank and land behind it washed away, creating the early stage of what was to become a huge erosion cavity. Alarmingly, it eroded the bank of Semington Brook back so much that the width of the footpath along the leat was only one metre wide.

On the 27th October, a full week later, I discovered three people from the EA, who said they were lowering the tilt gate to its lowest level possible.

Over the last 17 years, the bank has always been sound and has never been breached.

Over the next few days, the breach became considerably worse; with the additional rainfall from Storm Ciaran and, on 3 November, the footpath was completely washed away. The breach has continued to widen to this day. As things now stand (pm on 8 January) approximately half a tonne of water per second (0.5 cumec) is flowing through the breach into Semington Brook below.

We take the depletion of the water in the leat extremely seriously.

As a consequence, we have hired Cain Bio-Engineering (aka The River Doctors') to carry out repairs as soon as possible.

They have already removed two large branches, one of which was lying partially submerged, across the leat's flow path and are now planning to make a temporary flow diversion to allow them to survey and repair the bank breach.

They urgently need to reduce the flow through the breach in the hope of reducing the risk of 'Headward Retreat' (a process in which the erosion heads back upstream leaving a cavity in the leat bed). They are currently carrying out survey and design work to achieve this.

Meanwhile, one action they recommended was to reduce flood flows from the mill leat into the breach cavity by opening the mill sluices to drain off as much excess flow as possible. This has been done; keeping the sluice at the mill open is critical to minimise further damage at the breach and to make it possible to carry out clearance, inspection, and survey work within the dangerous breach cavity.

We are doing everything possible to make sure that both arms of Semington Brook are returned to their former state, with the public footpath re-opened.

Complete repairs to the Brook cannot be carried out until the water level is much lower and the breach itself has been de-watered. Being realistic, this means that the final repairs will not be completed for several months.

We hope Semington Brook together with its lovely Riverside Walk can be restored to its former glories as soon as possible. We're working with the Environment Agency, Wiltshire Council, together with our two Parish Councils to hopefully bring this about.

WORTON COMMUNITY SPEEDWATCH End of 2023 summary

(Speedwatch sessions are of 45 minutes duration)

Speed Indicator Devices (SIDs)

Following extensive research Worton Parish Council identified and purchased two speed indicator devices for installation on the village High Street. The two devices are located at the Eastern and Western entrances to the village and have been operating since early 2023.

The main purpose of the devices is to alert motorists to their speed and encourage them to observe the 30MPH village limit.

The table below shows the results obtained by the Community Speedwatch team in the course of their sessions of 45 minutes duration in 2022 before the introduction of the devices and 2023 following the deployment:

Year	Sessions	Total vehicle count	Vehicles exceeding 30MPH speed limit	Vehicles reported to Wiltshire Police
2022	129	42111	3101	656
2023	106	37584	1673	295

In addition the SIDs also monitor traffic volume, over a 24 hour period, and speeds. In the seven months from 1st June to 31st December 2023, **725,000** vehicle movements were recorded.

At the end of every month vehicle speed data is downloaded from the SIDs and sent to the Wiltshire Police Team SID Project. This is added to data from other locations across Wiltshire and analysed by them to identify areas of excessive speed in the county. This enables them to more effectively deploy the Road Traffic Units. We have seen the teams in the village over the past year and they have been successful in identifying drivers exceeding the speed limit.





MESSAGE FROM OUR WILTSHIRE COUNCILLOR

February 2024

Flooding issues are a priority for Wiltshire Council

Thankfully parishes across Devizes Rural West avoided the worst of Storm Henk. Brilliant team work by residents in Potterne to keep drains clear of debris meant that properties in Coxhill Lane and Duck Street remained dry this time. I am aware of other property flooding issues in Whistley Road (Potterne), Erlestoke, Marston and Worton, and of highways flooding issues across the area. Over the next few months, I will continue to work with Wiltshire Council's Flooding team to secure further improvements - the Council is investing an extra £1.5m into flooding prevention.

Following Storm Henk, the Government has made grant funding available for affected homeowners and businesses to apply for Government grant funding. There are several different types of support, depending on the damage and the type of property affected, including Property Flood Resilience Repair Grant Scheme, Farming Recovery Fund, Council Tax Relief and Business Rates Discount. www.wiltshire.gov.uk/civil-emergencies-flooding. Homeowners and businesses that have been affected by flooding from Storm Henk should email stormhenksupport@wiltshire.gov.uk.

You may see Parish Stewards at work across the area – they are responsible for specific aspects of general maintenance. Many villages also have wonderful volunteers who arrange litter picking, leaf clearing, cutting back vegetation and generally keeping our villages looking good. This benefits everyone and without this work our communities would be much less pleasant places to live.

Keeping our verges clear of weeds and drains clear of leaves and other blockages is a significant task and when you consider the vast amount of highway, both urban and rural in Wiltshire, you will understand that this is not a task that can only fall to the local Authority or volunteer groups to undertake.

You may already have a scheme in your area where you have 'Adopted a drain'. Put simply, if we could all make sure that the drains close to our homes, and where we walk in our villages are clear of leaves and any accumulated debris, excess water would flow better and keep pavements and the surrounding area free of standing water. This also applies to weeds at the edge of the road or pavement, where build-up of weeds can prevent rainwater flowing to the nearest drain.

If you do have a blocked drain that you cannot clear, please report it on the MyWilts App.

Please consider keeping the verges and drains near to your home clear of fallen leaves and debris. We can all do our bit to help keep the water moving. Thank you.

FLOWER OF THE MONTH



Viola

Violets are believed to have been cultivated since at least 500 B.C. and originate in the northern hemisphere. They show their blooms from spring well into late summer, depending on the species. And there are over 400 varieties. The viola should not be confused with an African Violet that originates in east Africa and has thicker, heavier leaves and blooms.

The violet appears in Greek mythology as Aphrodite's sacred flower. While in Christianity, the violet symbolized the Virgin Mary's humility and modesty and are often depicted in paintings of her holding Jesus in her arms.

In herbal uses, they are often mixed into concoctions and used to strengthen the immune system, soothe sore throats, and detoxifying the body. They often appear as decorations in salads and sweets, and are, in fact edible.

Their colours are prescribed specific meanings:

Yellow—high worth White—innocence and purity Purple—truth and loyalty Blue—faithfulness and devotion

WORTON PARISH COUNCIL

We had a very useful meeting this month and it was great to meet Catherine and Lionel our new Bridge editors. We have decided to change the meeting start time to **7pm** in the hope that this will prove more manageable for all concerned. Perhaps this might encourage more residents to come along and get more insight into the workings of our village and what comes up.

Waterway

At the time of writing, there has been a lot of concern about village water courses. As I have intimated previously, the role and power of the Parish Council in this area is very limited and specific. Like all residents, we are concerned when the village environment seems under threat. Solutions are never simple and frequently expensive. Cllr Patricia Goodenough has agreed to pass on residents' concerns regarding the Mill Race and associated water course issues to those we understand are looking into the issue.

Traffic

Bob Mitchell shared the summary data for the last 6 months from the SIDS. This is certainly encouraging as there has been a significant reduction when compared with data from before the SIDS were in place. Please take time to review his article elsewhere in The Bridge as this represents a 55% fall - a testimony to the hard work and resilience of the Speedwatch team.

With these numbers, we are prepared to lobby as hard as we can (indeed villagers have been making this point for a very long time). The challenge of getting "something done" is huge when the situation we face is placed in the wider local and regional context. We are, as always, open to reasonable suggestions.

Cllr Richard Slack continues to head up our liaison with the Devizes LHFIG group which is the best way to access financial and practical support for projects to improve the traffic and related issues such as pedestrian safety. We are already hoping to progress on the idea of using an Auto speedwatch system but are also re-considering the viability of a 20mph speed limit through part of the village. If any progress is made in this area, full details will be shared before any final decision is made.

Parish precept

The most significant decision made at the meeting was to approve the level of the Parish precept for 2024/25—the amount residents pay each year as part of the Council tax. We have endeavoured to keep the amount and any increases as small as possible. Over the period that I have been a member of the Council we have consistently achieved this. Largely due to careful, detailed scrutiny and considerable savings made by the efforts of councilors

and other residents (many thanks for your support) to take on tasks ourselves rather than outsourcing. Thus, against a background of high inflation and significantly higher increases in other budgets, we have been able to significantly limit the precept figure. The process may seem complex, but please have a look at the Community website (under finance) where more detail will appear in due course.

The precept represents a small proportion of the total council tax bill, but as they used to say in an annoying advert 'every little helps'!

Village Environment Group

Whilst on the subject of self help, Cllr Malcolm Powell gave more details on the proposed Village Environment Group which he will be heading up. Malcolm will give more detail at our February meeting, but the new group will provide an opportunity to have quality time outdoors whilst making a real difference to our environment and even improving fitness! More to follow in due course.

Jubilee Footpath

I am very much hoping to welcome more on board to help with progressing the Jubilee footpath project. Although this will likely overlap with Malcolm's Environment group in the course of time, our initial need is for support to enable us to access funding to simply get our plaque in place to enable an official "opening" and project launch. We have had to delay whilst certain issues were cleared up, but this has proved a blessing in disguise as we can now see a route to an even better result. I am hoping to have shared some of these ideas at the Newcomers Welcome Party in the hope of involving new residents, but, of course, all help is welcome. If you want to know more, please contact myself (Barry@worton.org.uk) or Patricia Goodenough directly, or via Jules, our clerk.

Newland Homes Update

Lastly, a quick update from Newland Homes. The most recent information I have is that preliminary work should have begun by the time of publication, with work on housing started by the end of February. I'm sure we all await developments with interest!


