PASTORAL LETTER

One of the joys of coming to be the Rector of a group of villages like this is the strength of community life. The annual Worton and Marston newcomers' party, for example, helps recent arrivals become active members of our groups and clubs in a way few other villages have. It is always heartening to see how many people give up their time and talents to make this happen.

In contrast to all this, the world has become a frightening place for many people. Wars and rumours of wars dominate the news, and old certainties crumble by the month. The last time I can remember such a dramatic shift in the world was at the end of the 1980s, but that was a positive and optimistic time. This is not.

One of the things I notice in my travels is that in many other parts of the world there is a great deal of optimism about the future, even in places that are repressive by our standards, like China and Saudi Arabia, or very poor, like Kenya. In countries like those, I often find people working in tourist-related jobs telling me how pessimistic and fearful of the future they find their Western customers. Worse, I think, than our fear that things will get worse is our sense that we can do nothing about it; that decisions are taken on a level beyond our capacity to influence.

One thing we can influence, however, is the quality of life in our own communities, all the more because they are small communities. Just one more person turning up to an event can make a huge difference to its mood. Often, it's just a matter of turning off the TV or the tablet and giving up doomscrolling for a few hours to spend an evening in the company of others. Sometimes it's just a matter of going to meet a pal in the pub rather than WhatsApping them. We were made to be in the company of others; the way we spend our lives behind our own four walls, constantly squinting at screens, is a very recent phenomenon and it probably isn't doing us much good, mentally or physically.

Could you be another person who turns up at the gardening club? Or Brownies and Rainbows groups are some of the last remaining in this part of Wiltshire—could a little of your time help secure their long-term future?

It is also the case in church that a couple of extra faces on a Sunday morning can help lift the mood tremendously, in one of the few places where anyone can just turn up, at least one a week. We will also need two new churchwardens this year, as Heather and Jean retire after many years' long service. There are many ways in which a little sacrifice of time and care on your part can shed a little light in a darkening world.

ANNUAL PAROCHIAL CHURCH MEETING

Every six years the Church of England is required to update its Electoral Roll. The Electoral Roll is your parish church's register of electors and joining the Church Electoral Roll means that you can have your say and vote on church matters, attend the Annual Parochial Church Meeting and stand for election to the PCC. In addition, those who live outside the Parish but are on the Electoral Roll enjoy all the rights and privileges that go with being resident in the parish (for example, baptisms and weddings).

However, if you live outside the Parish you must have been worshipping in your local church for a minimum period of six months. With your name on the Electoral Roll you will be supporting your chruch and the strength of the church can be seen in our local area, and across the Diocese. 

MESSAGE FROM OUR WILTSHIRE COUNCILLOR

Ensuring tight and proper finances, and a fair deal for Council Taxpayers: Proposed Budget to be discussed at Full Council

By the time you read this article, Wiltshire Council will have discussed and agreed its 2025/26 budget and provided its third formal financial update of the 2024/25 financial year.

Based on information up to the end of December 2024 – the third quarter forecast a net overspend of around £1.7m, equivalent to around 0.3% of net spend. Much of the forecasted overspend during the year has been due to continued challenges in social care that authorities across the country are experiencing, particularly adult services - with increased demand and the higher cost of care packages, particularly for cases that are complex. The area of adult services is now forecast to overspend more than the previous quarter - with the current total at around £6.9m. Across the organisation the council has put in several measures, including the management of vacancies to reduce the cost of staffing, and challenging and halting non-essential and discretionary spend wherever possible.

Wiltshire Council's Cabinet also approved the council's proposed budget for 2025/26 of around £527m, compared to last year's £490m. Although the council has received some extra social care funding from government of around £4.8m, challenges have emerged following confirmation of its provisional local government finance settlement at the end of last year, which the council has had to respond quickly to. Through changes to government grants and employees' national insurance contributions, Wiltshire Council has almost £8m less national funding this year. Most of this funding was via the Rural Services Delivery Grant, which was designed to enable large rural authorities like Wiltshire to meet the extra costs involved in delivery of services across a wide geography with significant travel times - issues not faced by urban authorities.

The council has opted to propose to not increase the Wiltshire Council element of council tax by the full amount government has permitted - instead, proposing to raise it by 4.5% (2.5% for basic council tax and a 2% adult social care levy) rather than the full 4.99% allowed. This would see an increase of £1.56 per week for those in a Band D property for the Wiltshire Council element of council tax. The adult social care levy will raise £7m and will help to fund the £20m of inflation and demand growth that has been built into the Adult Social Care budget.

The most significant areas of spend outlined in the proposals are:

- Adult services £194m
- Families and children £75m
- Highways and transport £43.4m
- Environment (including waste) £49.5m
- Education and skills £38m

A public Budget Webinar took place on 4 February - a recording can be watched at <u>YouTube</u>. It shows that the preventative long-term approach has given Wiltshire Council financial resilience to respond effectively to challenges and still gives opportunities to be ambitious and invest for the good of everyone in the county.



Again, I've got to hand the plaudits to Cllr Stokes on this. We have a plan, time scale and team taking shape. Of course, there's always room for more, so please get in touch with Nick if you can play a part.

One of the most enjoyable events that takes place is the annual Newcomers party, ably hosted by stalwarts from the local community. It was great to meet new villagers and find an interest in playing a part in village life. Nick did particularly well in finding volunteers for the Best Kept Village entry. He will keep everybody informed on this as we get nearer to the unannounced visit of the competition judges, which should happen in the summer. They will be given a recommended route through the village in advance (it's allowed to ask them not to judge locations that are undergoing construction work, for example), but it's important that all of us do our best to make our environment as pleasant as possible for our own benefit - that's surely what this whole project is about?

If the process goes smoothly, we will have no idea that the inspection is taking place (unlike an iconic episode of Fawlty Towers that springs to mind!)

It's been quite an eye opener to see the transformation taking place at the Kempsters Reach / Primrose Rise development. It's well known that the saga linked to the development has sown seeds of division in the community, for obvious reasons, and it's much easier for someone like me, who lives at some distance from the project, to take a more constructive standpoint, than someone who's life has been turned upside down by the construction and changed environment resulting,

However, it's really important to look forward and see the benefits that can result as far as the community as a whole is concerned. From my personal (continued on next page)

perspective, I have found the representatives of Newlands homes to be open to dialogue, and there are examples of where they have listened to concerns and acted on them. There has been support for the Best kept Village group and the Queen's Walkway plan, which should link with the reconstituted footpath at Kempster's reach when the site nears completion. I have enjoyed the chance to share anecdotes about Worton from our shared history. We want our village to be as welcoming to our new residents as it has always been.

We are very lucky to be looking after our 2-year-old granddaughter regularly, and she has helped to give me an insight into just what the new development can mean in practical terms. She has been delighted by the "diamonds in the sky", along with various diggers and cranes!

For those not privy to her world, the "diamonds" in question are, in fact, triangles -being carefully placed for roofs to be assembled around them. To her, it's sheer magic! Of course, reality is different, but it serves to remind me that we need to take care to provide a future which reflects her, and others, dreams. Whether that is in Worton is quite another matter but serves as a reminder of just how important it is that conservation and development work together in harmony, as illustrated by her tuneful (biased granddad!) rendition of "Twinkle Twinkle" as she watches the building work in fascinated wonder.

What is certainly true is that we need to work in harmony with our young residents and the developers to make the best use of the finance available to renovate our existing leisure facilities -and, as I have indicated previously, I see this as reflecting the needs of the whole community. Not just the children (though they are the priority). I've got my eye on a bit more table tennis, and maybe even "pickleball" facilities. So watch this space!

I'll close with a reminder that the current incarnation of the Parish Council ends in May (four years being up). If anyone is interested in standing for election, please get your skates on as forms have to be completed ASAP. Check out the Wiltshire website for details, or contact Jules, our clerk, for more information.

BEST KEPT VILLAGE COMPETITION 2025

Villagers will probably be aware that Worton Parish Council has entered the village for the above competition organised by CPRE - the Countryside Charity. This competition aims to identify the Wiltshire villages which best embody a place where residents make the effort to show that they are proud of their village through community events and volunteer work to make the village attractive. This is the first time Worton has taken part (although Marston has in the past) which means that we also qualify for the Best Newcomer section.

Participation in this competition requires community effort which is already under way, in addition to showing the extent that village facilities are well used and regular community events take place. For example, with the support of Councillor Goodenough and her team, Back Lane has been cleared to allow the snowdrops to flourish and the Village Hall trustees have organised the clearance of vegetation on Church Lane to allow the car park to be better used. A further group have committed to refurbishing the two bus shelters before the judging, and more than 20 residents have signed up for the working parties that will take place in the run-up to judging which starts mid-May. However, we are always looking out for more volunteers as well as encouraging residents to 'do their bit' in their gardens where they abut onto a road or onto Back Lane - for example by cutting back hedges before nesting starts in May.

There are a number of activities planned and I encourage villagers to put these dates in their diaries:

Saturday 22 March - at the Village Hall 'Cafe' afternoon, there will be a short presentation, starting at 2.30pm, on what is involved, together with the opportunity to sign up for one of the working parties. There are two of these, one focusing on Back Lane and Church Lane, and one on the High Street from Sandleaze Court to Mill Head, plus Sandleaze, Gaisford Chase and Cedar Close. Three weekends have been set aside with work taking place on either the Saturday or Sunday morning as follows:

April 26 or April 27 May 10 or May 11 May 24 or May 25

It is hoped that there will then be an opportunity for a little social activity thanks to support secured from Newland Homes.

The first round of judging will take place by mid-June with the winners in each area and each size group going forward to a second stage in July, and the prize giving at the end of September when winners will receive some financial reward and a plaque thanks to sponsorship from Idverde, Wiltshire County Council and Renelec.





FLOWER OF THE MONTH



Orchid (Orchidaceae)

Who gave to thee that name
So full of homely and most pleasant thought?
It's charm might win renown
For many a thing with far less beauty fraught.

Orchids, for all their challenges to flower on my window sill, are resilient and hardy. They are second only to the daisy family in their known species. You can find orchids on every continent, except Antarctica. They have adapted to grow in all types of environments with only the harshest exceptions (glaciers and deserts). They have even been found growing underground. This makes them a great candidate for propagation on other planets, if only they were edible.

Louis Liger, a French writer and agronomist, invented a classical myth about how the orchids came to be. He attributed their formation to the ancient Greeks and Romans. Using the story of Adonis and Narcissus for inspiration, he created the figure of Orchis, the son of a nymph and satyr who defiles a priestess of Bacchus during one of their many festivals. This resulted in Orchis being killed and transformed into an orchid flower as punishment by the gods.

There is an orchid growing in the UK, that is so special, that it has its own security service and surveillance system. The lady's slipper orchid (*Cypripedium calceolus*) was thought to be extinct and a small, dedicated committee was formed in 1971 to protect the orchid from collectors. The location of the site is a closely guarded secret known only by the committee and their trusted wardens who guard the location during spring and summer months.


